from every corner of the world, belonging to a diversity of religions, walks of life, cultures and upbringings. It is a truly miraculous thing that we've come to accept as pretty normal, but which is anything but! It is a powerful experience for each of us and for the whole, and I also happen to believe it has an impact on the place where the congress is taking place, though that is something we can't quantify or dwell upon.

This latihan is such an amazing gift, so beyond the comprehension of most of us, that there is little left that we can do except express our gratitude.

Expressing Gratitude


So, how do we express that gratitude? Well, as I understand it, by putting the latihan into practice; and the work we need to do at a World Congress offers just such an opportunity. At the 3rd World Congress in Japan in 1967, Bapak had some suggestions that seem to reflect this: ...when discussing and debating at your meetings today, tomorrow and the following days, do not forsake the

calmness and tranquillity of your inner self; be as if you were about to do the latihan.

In this way you will be able to find the most fitting answers within your own individual being. ...because we are a group of people who have received the guidance of Almighty God, and our heart, mind and desires are subordinate to our soul, which



is the link between Almighty God – or the power of God – and our self. Therefore our congress has a different character, and the discussions should not cause troubles or misunderstandings; the result being that our congress can proceed smoothly without any difficulties. (67 TYO 1)

It probably goes without saying that if our discussions and meetings get overly heady, bogged down and argumentative, there's a good chance we've stepped away from the approach mentioned above. This can happen very easily, particularly if delegates or any member contributing to a discussion come totally unprepared. The way we prepare can also be considered part of putting the latihan into practice: reading and informing ourselves in a quiet state, so that our own egos and self-interest don't take over.

The good thing about this approach, is that if we give a space for God's grace to guide our work, things get dealt with incredibly quickly. I have seen this happen time and again. And we really need things not to get stuck, as there are so many issues to deal with at World Congress.

When we go away complaining that it was all just too much work, and no time for anything with 'real' content, let's be careful about blaming anyone else but ourselves. Allowing the latihan and God's grace to guide our work is a choice we each make... or not. It is our opportunity to fill the work with real content. It doesn't depend on the venue, the organisation of the meetings, who did this or who did that. It depends on how each of us is putting the latihan into practice at any given moment.

Congress is an Enterprise

A couple of years ago I asked a young Subud entrepreneur how he was finding the challenge of setting up and running an enterprise. He replied: "It's brilliant. It's where you get to check the reality of all the airy fairy stuff!" Exactly! We can take part in amazing latihans with hundreds of people, test about our talents or about how the angels in heaven sing, read every one of Bapak and Ibu's talks; however, it is in the 'putting it into practice' that we can see to what degree we are allowing these wonderful gifts to have a reality in this world.

World Congress is, in a sense, an enterprise – you could even see it as one of the first enterprises Bapak established. It doesn't aim to make big profits, but certainly to break even; and it's an endeavour we can all invest in – even if we are not actually attending. We can invest with our awareness, inner support, interest and so on... and even by donating to the various support funds making it happen or by sponsoring someone else to attend if we are not going for whatever reason.

This is our World Congress, so let's all do whatever we can to make it all that Bapak would have hoped for.



World Congress Frequently Asked Questions

Invaluable information from the World Congress web site... http://subudworldcongress2014.com

Q: What are the dates of the congress?

A: 2nd to 17th of August 2014. The 2nd is the arrival day; the 17th is the departure day.

Q: What is the weather like in Puebla in August?

A: It is sunny and warm but with rainstorms usually in the afternoon. Bring a light rain coat.

Q: I have heard Puebla has a high altitude. What are the health incidences?

A: Puebla is situated on a plateau, 2,100 meters or about 7,000 feet above sea level. You can see the Popocatepetl volcano looming up to 5,000 meters on the horizon. The altitude level may cause one to feel mildly out of breath as if one was running or walking up a hill. It would be wise for anyone with a heart condition to consult their doctor prior to coming.

Q: Is there a danger regarding the proximity of the Popocatepetl volcano?

A: Popocatepetl is an active volcano, which regularly smokes. Some people say that this condition makes it safer than a volcano quietly simmering underground and finally blowing its top. Popocatepetl is closely monitored and research shows that Puebla is NOT within the danger zone. The worst would be some discomfort from the ash. Statistically, it gives off more smoke and ash in the dry winter season with much less during the wet summer season.

Q: How do I get to Puebla?

A: Most European airlines fly directly into Mexico City. From there, one takes a 2-hour coach ride to Puebla. Congress is setting up Subud coaches for arrivals (August 1st, 2nd and 3rd) and also for departures (August 16th, 17th and th) which will drop off and pick up at hotels directly. You can book online when registering.

If you arrive on days not listed above, it is very easy to get onto one of the hourly buses to Puebla (bus line Estrella Roja) directly at the airport.

There are flights directly into Mexico City. As of next year, there will also be flights from Shanghai and Tokyo.

United and American Airlines have some flights directly into Puebla, from Houston and Washington. Check it out on their websites. They are hoping for more direct routes before next summer.

Transport on Arrival in Mexico

From the World Congress Team...

We have received many emails from members who have questions about travel between Mexico City Airport and Puebla. Please be assured that we are doing everything possible to ensure that you are taken care of. We will have greeters in the International Arrivals area of the Mexico City Airport and the Puebla Airport to assist you from August 1 through August 3. Please look for greeters holding a Subud sign after you go through customs.

TRANSPORTATION BETWEEN MEXICO CITY AIRPORT AND PUEBLA

If you are flying into Mexico City, you will need transportation to Puebla, which is a 2 hour trip from the airport. Also be aware that customs can take at least one hour. There are 3 options:

1 – Congress Shuttle Buses

Congress shuttle buses are available ONLY Aug 1, 2, 3 and Aug 16, 17, 18. If you register for one of our buses, a greeter will be there, no matter what the time you arrive.

July 31 arrivals: We know that there is a large group arriving from Montreal around 15:00 on the 31st of July to México City. Though we had not included shuttles for the 31st, we could do so if enough people are arriving, so IF YOU ARE ARRIVING on the 31st of JULY around 15:00 and are interested in a shuttle please write urgently to Ghazzali Torres at swc2014.transportation@gmail.com

If you are arriving earlier than August 1 and you need assistance, please send your date and time of arrival to Ghazzali Torres <swc2014.transportation@gmail.com>

If you have already reserved a Congress shuttle bus, we URGENTLY need your flight information and hotel information so that bus drivers will know where to pick you up and drop you off.

To go back to your online registration to register for the Congress Shuttle, or to add your flight and hotel information, click here. You will need to enter your confirmation number.

2 – Public Buses

If you are coming before August 1 or leaving after August 18 and need a bus to/from Puebla and Mexico City Airport we recommend using Estrella Roja Bus Service and reserving online. Round trip is about \$40 US

Note: these buses are all air-conditioned and very comfortable. They are equipped with Wi-Fi and a snack is provided. You will need to take a taxi to your hotel, so have about 100 - 200 pesos with you to pay the taxi driver.

If you are a group of members arriving at the same time, you can reserve as a group.

3 – Taxis and Rental Cars

Most major car rental companies are available from the Mexico City Airport. Taxis from Mexico City to Puebla could cost as much as \$200 USD.

Success and the Subud Experience

Something new is coming to the World Congress...

At the World Congress, Subud members from around the world involved in business, the arts, professions and social welfare will tell their stories and how being in Subud was part of their success. We will have six panel discussions of four speakers, spaced over the length of the Congress. Each speaker will have 15 minutes to tell their "story." Following the presentations, we will have a Question and Answer period and then will provide an opportunity for the audience to mingle with speakers.

Panels will include successful entrepreneurs, Academy Award winners, and philanthropists. Subud members who

are scheduled to participate in these panels have led worldwide peace initiatives, founded schools in Africa, started "green" businesses, and made important contributions to health related fields. The panelists include accomplished musicians, authors, and pioneers in many fields. For many, where they started is very different from where they are now.

The genesis for this program occurred at the Australian National Congress held in January of this year on the Gold Coast in Queensland. There, a few members were invited to tell their stories.

Interest grew, attendance mushroomed, and additional speakers were invited during the event. We realized that we were on to something when members attended the program rather than lazing at the awesome beach bordering the Congress site. Feedback from the sessions held was wonderfully positive. The audience said that the program was ... "something new" ... "fascinating"... "really useful" These reactions are why we are bringing the concept to the World Congress.

Good things happen when we share our experiences. The organizers of the program hope that those attending might hear some idea or 'spark' to help propel them in their own journey to success. The stories we heard in Australia affirmed that the guidance we receive can have positive effects on our here and now.

Here are a few examples of Subud members who will tell their tales in Puebla. Isaac Goff, an American entrepreneur with decades of experience, turned his company, Dharma Mercantile, into what may be the largest internet supplier of yarn and tie die materials in the world. Livingston Armytage started his career as a commercial lawyer in Sydney, but now travels to locales such as Micronesia, Cambodia, and Nepal, where he advises governments on how to reform their justice systems.

We will hear from Uraidah Hassini, a young Subud member a few years out of college, who founded The Women Worldwide Initiative, a mentorship program to empower young women. Dorothea Gillim, once an elementary school teacher, now writes and produces children's programs. She produced the most popular children's program in the U.S., Curious George, and has an Emmy award to show for it. David Anderson makes films and commercials, among other endeavors. The British Academy award and the Hiroshima Peace Prize that he received should tell you that his work is compelling.

Others stories are different, but no less interesting. Andrew Holloway, a member from England, parlayed his interest in carpentry and conservation into a successful company. Green Oak Carpentry, which he founded, specializes in conservation carpentry and timber frame design. It has completed a number of major public projects and won numerous awards along the way. Alexandra Asseilly, who splits her time between Lebanon and England, had the vision to initiate a peace and forgiveness project in war torn Lebanon. Her unrelenting conviction to initiate concrete steps to foster forgiveness has inspired many and she is a sought after speaker world wide.

Many others have stories to tell. We will have speakers from Indonesia, Africa, South America, Mexico and New Zealand. Perhaps the most difficult task the organizers of these panels faced was selecting who should participate. The number of Subud members who have interesting stories and have achieved recognition related to their work is simply astonishing. At the end of the day, we did our best to select a diverse group, representing different countries, fields, ages, and genders. We hope there will be interest and opportunities for similar programs at future events, because many other interesting stories will remain to be told.

If you are attending the World Congress, we hope you will attend some sessions, participate, and be inspired. To reach interested members who will not come to Puebla, we are working on plans to disseminate written and perhaps audio highlights of this event. Stay tuned.

SESI News

SESI Board To Be Appointed at Congress

The term of the SESI Board extends from World Congress to World Congress. At this

time the Coordinator is appointed at the Congress and he/she then forms an Executive Board and an Advisory Board subject to testing. All those who wish to be tested for these positions will be advised, at Congress, when and where this will occur.

New SESI Board Appointment: Stuart Cooke has been appointed to the Board of SESI. He was previously an Advisor. He has represented SESI on the Intranet project; developing new web sites, communications tools and new databases of members' occupations and expertise.

Kalimantan Oil Palm Project: The project team in Indonesia has taken an extremely

cautious approach to this project, particularly in considering environmental, land use, zoning and social impact issues. It has subsequently been decided not to continue with the project at this time. Other international enterprise opportunities are in progress and new options are being explored..

SESI has made some modest progress in rejuvenating Bapak's recommendations. In broad terms they concerned the issue of how to finance the needs of our Association through establishing SUBUD enterprises and the important role that SESI would play to support this objective.

SESI has continued to collaborate with a team of investors towards meeting this objective that had established several enterprises in Kalimantan as model projects, headed by Ruslan Morris. It is expected that at least one of these enterprises should be able to begin sending profits to SUBUD in 2014 and beyond. These will be important funds to assist SESI expand its remit over time, as it is now planning to do.

SESI is well aware that many members seek support and collaboration

to develop or strengthen their personal businesses/enterprises. In addition SESI is often asked to contribute business skills and expertise to the development and support of SUBUD Centers.

To these ends the activities that SESI proposes include:

- expand the capacities and the remit of SES Representatives at National levels to National Committees (who also serve Centers), with SESI support;
- establish SESI Representation at Zone levels reporting to the Zone Representatives (as in Zone 3)
- form databases of skills and expertise to support SES(I) and those National bodies willing to proceed, to focus on developing enterprises specifically to strengthen their funding needs;
- establish working groups to provide professional support to the development of SUBUD Centers on all levels -- International, National and Local;
- establish a suitable form of Chamber of Commerce of members who own enterprises or have business skills as a focal point for mutual support and the creation of technical working groups;
- consider establishing a World SUBUD Financial Institution/ Bank;
- establish SESI as a separate legal entity from the WSA to avoid legal liability issues.

To Europe and Africa

Luqman Penseney, WSA Chair, writes of his recent travels...

The end of 2013 and the first two months of 2014 were dominated by, and focused on, an extraordinary experience for me: a long awaited visit to three African countries, following a visit to six countries in Europe.

I had been profoundly affected by three of Ibu Rahayu's 'signpost' letters written to various congresses since 2010. I felt myself working alongside Ibu's (advisory) mission, reminding us of our

need to consciously support the inner process of reawakening ourselves by refreshing a new deeper connection with Bapak's guidance, to become aware of the potential for the next phase of Subud's development. I realized that Ibu's advice in these letters formed a sort of roadmap.

I covered 6 groups in the UK; then 6 in Europe; next 10 in Africa before returning via Lisbon, Wisma Mulia and Manchester to Toronto and home to Vancouver. An extraordinary journey of great contrasts: from comfortable rural winter, older cities and facilities in England, Holland, France, to the heat of South Africa, Malawi and Spain to the overwhelming poverty and dysfunctional aspects of DR Congo and smaller cousin, Congo Brazzaville, across the Congo River.

Initially, what I thought was a trip for raising awareness of the coming World Congress and connecting with the members in Europe and Africa on their situation, it became a much more profound odyssey centered on reawakening within Subud, nothing less.

I felt it as I sat with group after group in 9 countries. Each one different and yet rooted in the latihan. Human and challenged by life in so many different ways... feeling the deep inner need to reawaken to Bapak's challenge to us, of facing God and our lives again – with new Courage!

The need to consciously discipline ourselves to revisit Bapak's advice; review our individual and group situations in terms of how fully engaged we are... submission in the latihan yes – but also self discipline in putting that latihan into practice... Worship in latihan but also putting it into practice in our work.

UK – Wisma Mulia, Exeter, Loudwater, Central London, Norwich and Lewes

The odyssey began at Wisma Mulia with a talk at this 40 year old Subud retirement community to perhaps 15 of our oldest Subud members on the work of the international organization – average audience age 90 years old! Wisma Mulia is now less than 50% Subud members.

Mainland Europe – France, Holland and Spain

After visiting Paris, I headed 200 kms north to Rotterdam to be met by a young couple Regina and Feodor. Then to meeting the burgeoning older but very active Rotterdam 25-30 member group with its newer, open plan, 2-storey modern Subud house. Having just had new picture windows donated by Subud Holland with a symbolic new vista onto the canal! This has opened the prospect of a new weddings space rental enterprise for the attractive spaces!

A new deeper connection with Bapak's guidance

Malawi and South Africa

On arriving in Malawi's bucolic, quiet, small Blantyre airport, I was met by an old friend from the early 70's, Ruslan Moore and Farid Raidan, brother of Rasjid, patriarch of the Raidan (Subud Muslim) family. An extraordinarily harmonious and deeply sincere, new Subud group following Bapak's guidance as well as Islamic principles. All the 'ingredients' necessary to form a balanced community life including social outreach, enterprise, community conscious-

ness and latihan premises, were present. Those that Bapak identified as being fruits of the latihan were already established.

Congo Kinshasa

Finally the time came to grit my teeth and leave beautiful sunny South Africa and venture, (it felt like tumbling down) into the enormous poverty and challenges of the Congo. I admit to feeling great trepidation after all my reality-check briefings by Hamida Thomas, SDIA, and others!

I found myself forming the focus of an instant 6-person team with whom I travelled to 7 centres and projects over 10 days. The team comprised: Rida Liobo Loote, Zone 6 Rep.; Albert Diluambanzila, Subud Congo chair; Subud Congo KC's, Louisa and Sylvain as well as Papi Kabondo, our translator, and sometime committee councilor. This delegation travelled to three of the six Kinshasa groups.

Kingantoko: The Subud Centre is now only 2 km from the boundary with Kinshasa Province, and 27 km from downtime Kinshasa. It reminded me of Cilandak on the edge of Jakarta in the 1970's. Eventually the city will overwhelm this rural area and Kingantoko will take on new importance as a community Centre. Already the inner suburbs are only 7-8 km away.

The dream of Kingantoko with its aging but spacious, Muchtar Martins-designed Subud Centre is set on beautiful hills with vistas towards the Congo River to the north.

The anchor here now is the third and newest of the CSCOM Community Health Centres recently completed and sponsored by a private family foundation based in Toronto. It is part of a \$1M joint venture partnership with SDIA. The large new modern buildings and maternity centre support a local community of 10-12,000 and are impressive and clearly over-built to anticipate the city's growing health needs. Already the Kinshasa groups meet here monthly for latihans of 20-30 members.

Back to Europe: Alfragide

Lisbon was a physical and psychological shock being so clean, organized and with mild winter sunshine! After four weeks in Europe and three weeks in Africa, I was reeling.

We visited the Lisbon group and its large large 110m2 latihan room with spaces for daycare, counseling and kindergarten – a real feeling of blended group and SD spaces. Daniella, the principal, took me to visit the Alfrigide refugee school now 35 years old and we were all impressed by the team consisting mostly of young women providing counselling and therapeutic support for children of all situations from within the poor ex refugee suburbs.

Also striking was the deep emotional and spiritual bonds among the team. The children are so well cared for many literally don't want to leave to go home at night!

Vancouver

When I got back to Vancouver, I finished my odyssey with a short presentation to my home group. I felt strangely slowed down, more profoundly aware of everything around me. I realized (and quite unbeknownst to myself) I had been working alongside Ibu all that time! Not such a bad role to play.





But home at last home, after 72 days and back in my own bed!

Bapak's Original Recordings

Amalijah Thompson, WSA Archivist, writes...

The original tape recordings of Bapak's talks – those which today remain available to the future, arrived in Canberra on 28th May 2014.

The recordings had been with Memnon in Brussels being remastered to current preservation standard, courtesy of funding by MSF.

The next stage of this project is to check each tape visually, then prepare it for permanent storage in accor-

dance with normal archival practice. As each tape is checked, all the usual archival documentation will be done to record any available historical or technical information needed to ensure we retain a clear verifiable link between the original recording and the digital derivative

During the conversion from analogue to digital technical metadata was compiled documenting the process and this metadata will be linked to the above information

Information from each tape reel or tape case will be checked against the metadata to ensure the original tape remains linked to the derivative file so that it's possible in future to verify the authenticity of that digital file over time

Over time recordings have been lost for various reasons and therefore what remains is not everything that was originally recorded when Bapak gave a talk. We are fortunate that so many people from the very beginning of Subud made the effort to record and look after what we are still able to preserve today

Preservation is about many things not just environmental conditions or buildings. It requires an intellectual understanding of how archives are managed, of the historical context needed to retain authenticity as well as the parameters of handling each type of media. Today this includes an understanding of the management of digital files.

It's essential that what has been done over time in terms of collection, preservation and access is clearly

documented with the original recordings so that we can always prove with complete integrity that, what we say is a Bapak talk is in fact an untampered derivative of that talk

To do a project like this in a normal archival environment is relatively easy, taking into account all the technical and managerial issues involved. Once those are known, understood and 'managed' the process itself is relatively simple to carry out, given the right equipment and expertise

It's not as straightforward and it's certainly not easy to do a project like this in our organisation where all kinds of things seem to get dragged into the decision making process. This requires the retention of an inner comedienne at all times, or the ability to fly high above it all at all times – neither being successfully attained most of the time.

Proof and evidence of what God has given



Regardless the above the project remained about two things:

- The physical, technical, normal, preservation practice to preserve the talks in a normal, professional, material way as is our responsibility so to do and;
- The possibility to re-engage inwardly in a different way to deepen our respect for the content those physical items contained

One of the things I experienced when I first started working in our archives a few light years ago was that no matter what I was doing as I worked in a normal way, I was led back as I worked, led back to and reminded of Bapak's talks – even when the work I was doing wasn't on or about the talks themselves.

What I also experienced was that I was never allowed to stop at the talks, I was taken further back to the One who decreed the gift of the latihan for mankind at this time – Almighty God

I saw that the kejiwaan, the latihan, the Grace and Power of God flowed through and was evident in all our archives because the kejiwaan, the latihan, the Grace and Power of God flowed first of all through Bapak and then through the historical development of Subud – just as it flows through us even with our limitations and shortcomings as the latihan works in us

This evidence exists in our archives not only in the talks but in the archives generally which, when combined, reveal and provide the reality, clearly visible of the working of the Grace of God for our benefit and the benefit of mankind

This is the gift of the archives to Subud in a way, as is their capacity – when ultimately managed well – to provide proof and evidence of what God has given.

Why is This?

Raphael Bate has been walking the Camino pilgrimage in Spain. He arrives at his destination to find that the answer is a question...

Into my 4th week now, and after Astorga and the flat desert likeness of the meseta, I am into the Castille Leon region where it all starts to get gradually more dramatic with woodland paths, rocky roads, hills, moors and snow-capped mountains getting closer.

Day 22 was really the first time I felt complete; nothing to divert me from just walking, no blisters or foot problems, no aching back only the rhythm of walking totally flowing, pushing the land effortlessly under foot. Not in the zombie mode of endless straight paths under a relentless sun. This was a walker's high!

2 nights ago I stayed at an Alburgue that provided a meal also and the charge was" Donativo" Give what you think. It was run by 2 young guys who provided basic but clean accommodation. I also received a foot massage.

Day 23 Started when I heard the roar of wind through the door of the bedroom door. I put on 7 layers as I was about to ascend the first mountain since Roncevilles. We could see the snow on distant mountain tops from the village.

Head down and with the help of walking poles I went cross trailing onwards and upwards. There were some steep and muddy paths. On each side, big clumps of heathers gold, purple and pinks together with bright yellow broom. The increasing intensity of rain turning to snow. It's a pity I lost my gloves back in Logrono.

At Foncbaden it was advised to walk on the road rather than risking the dangers of the snow on the muddy conditions of the Camino path. After an hour of ascending I came across a car park with some information boards around. I thought this should be the place of the Cruce Ferro. It was.

This for me was a significant place on my last Camino. Now covered in snow it seemed smaller than I remembered it. It consists of a mound of stones on which is a very tall pole with a small cross on the top.

The Pilgrims bring with them from home a special stone that represents a prayer, a deep question, a pain or feeling that needs some sort of resolving or completion for the individual. They may say the official prayer or not, and then the stone is placed on the mound next to all the others at the foot of the cross. You do not have to be a Christian or a Druid to get meaning from this ritual.



As I laboured up the mound against the high wind and rain it was as though these efforts were a mirror of all the trials and joys of the last 23 days on the Camino AND at the same time a reflection of all this from my life thus far, all condensed into this moment at the Cruce Ferro. My heart started to melt and open and I could let it all go with a great cry of release from these burdens that I carry around.

A great cry of release...

With the smooth pebble I was carrying, I started to wish for the freedom from suffering and the causes of suffering of my friends and family. BUT this was insufficient and I had to ask for the freedom from suffering of all beings and from the causes of suffering. I then added my stone to the rest.

As I was descending the mountain, I was full of weeping and joy for no other reason, it seems than climbing a piles of stones and looking at a telegraph pole with a tiny cross on top. Why is this?

And the final word from Heather Bate...

He returned from Spain, having completed the Camino, on Saturday. Minus his boots which he had ritual-istically burned at the Land's End of Finesterre! Raphael walked the Camino in support of Susila Dharma.

Mirror Images

Hermia Brockway writes of "My Own Reflections on Helping People"...

Recently I've been reading passages or excerpts from Bapak's talks and comments from those Indonesian men who worked so very closely with Bapak in the early days. This confirmed my sense that in Indonesia (as to some extent in the rest of Asia maybe) feelings are far more important than thoughts.

On the contrary we in the West tend to train ourselves to think things through logically at the expense of feelings – we'd rather not trust 'feelings'. True, those emotions can often carry us far away from what we need to be concerned about most, and may well be what would be called 'nafsu' in the Subud lingo.

But 'feelings' in the Asian sense can also be telling us very important facts that we need to understand. This we must do by first of all accepting they are there; and secondly that 'they are what they are' – no more but also no less! Psychologically speaking, it's better not to ignore such feelings, no matter whether they are the carrying-away type or what we might call a 'sensing' of something or even 'intuition' maybe.

Bach Flower Remedies

I should mention here that I am a Bach Flower practitioner- i.e. I try to help people in difficulties whether big or small, temporary or long-standing, when their emotions get a bit traumatic. Such feelings are in the

above first category and are very negative; while the second type is what I call 'sensing' which is neutral or positive even though it may possibly feel to some extent 'disturbing' to the one experiencing it.

BFR remedies don't 'cure' you like a drug can do; they are very subtle in nature. When chosen rightly to suit the emotions that are uppermost, the client simply feels an easing, a relief of pressure, and they have a rebalancing effect overall. However these emotions tend to sometimes have their own life force so to speak.

Once one feeling has settled down, it may well be that another one comes forward, which was probably lower down the emotional hierarchy. This frequently



long drawn out process is very familiar to anyone who works as a counsellor as well as many a psychologically-oriented person, simply because simply because that's what happens at one time or another to all of us.

For we are creatures of immense complexity: – from childhood onwards we are collecting layers and layers of feelings corresponding to our life experiences. By the time we are adults we have formed multitudes of impressions about other people and our surroundings and the effects they have had on us, especially others' attitudes to ourselves, both positive and negative.

Usually our major concern is the resultant effects on me --but also we note what people say and do to others. It all helps to form an increasingly firm idea of what we believe ourselves to be, and helps develop our individual value systems

etc. Then some of us may eventually come to notice that sometimes it's not only ourselves but even our parents or earlier ancestors who have an effect on our inner lives.

So in the process we may sense some emotions of theirs, which can't clearly be separated from our own. I hope this doesn't sound too complicated; but the 'layering process' is the main theme of what I'm talking about – and it's universal, people everywhere have that process going on.

The Parallels

So the counsellor or BFR practitioner will first have to help the client deal with the feelings that are uppermost, help him or her to sort out that layer first. Then if more previously hidden feelings are uncovered later, the practitioner needs simply to support clients to get through the next layer, in their own time and always with their own consent and their growing understanding of feelings as they emerge.

The practitioner will never want to impose his own ideas on a client - e.g. by saying 'this is the way your feelings are going, this is what's wrong with you that causes this upset'. This de-layering process is the standard Bach practitioner way of conducting sessions, simply because each has to be dealt with as it emergesie. from what the clients themselves say, and how they understand what is going on within them.

Now we come back to Bapak and his assistant helpers. It is said that not only Bapak but also these men were often able to sense pretty clearly what was going on within another person who came to them for help with some life problem... but they would not refer directly to what they saw as the person's problem state. Perhaps a westerner might think-"Oh, because he doesn't want to offend him" or even "He hasn't the courage to tell him what's what" but that's misunderstanding the main point.

No Short Cut

They always believed there is no short cut, the person has to see the reason for his feeling for himself and telling him straight does nothing to promote an inevitable process of a changing understanding (which sadly may be maddeningly slow!) The man has to surrender himself, needs to give in, not clutch at this idea or that instead of the truth. They supported the suffering person by being available to listen or talk to him whenever needed.

Also these assistants of Bapak sometimes used other indirect means of clarification, such as telling a story which could help the person better understand his predicament. This is another Asian way of presenting our common human core of feelings and what triggers the difficulties in our lives – and is therefore more easily acceptable to the hearer.

They clearly believed that helping people is never effective if done from the outside. Moreover it may easily distort the relationship between the 'helper' and the 'helped' as one or the other starts to think in power terms; which I think is a very basic tenet that applies to all of us in Subud, as to the rest of the world.

Ibu Rahayu recently emphasised that the Subud word 'helper' means 'assistant to Bapak'- so I think we need to follow the model of these very gentle and sensitive men. And she has also emphasised in her talks how easily dangerous power relations can develop which will undermine the true nature of the helper role.

Is this Asian wisdom? Or simply the clarity brought about by the latihan in our endless search for truth? Either way I personally think it is advice that needs to be understood – that's why this article. I hope it helps even if only a little.

Our Well-trained Servants

David McCormack has written in with a quotation from Edward van Hien's book "What is Subud". David writes, "For me this is a practical book that keeps me in touch with what I need at certain times. Perhaps some of us, or at least my "self" at times, can doubt our own sanity and ability to stay with the spiritual training. At those times, the advice in the book brings me to a kind of 'logical sanity' about the process and my need for it and the good that comes later."...

Our bodies, emotions and intellects are, or should be, our servants. Obviously, clean, well trained and intelligent servants are better than dirty, ill-disciplined and foolish ones. Bapak stresses that these instruments of ours are useless in our search for God but that they are very necessary for life in this world and are in no way to be neglected or despised.

We have also been warned not to be in too much of a hurry to help others spiritually before we are in fact strong enough to do so. For most of us, spiritual 'capital' is as yet very limited and Bapak has compared excessive and premature zeal with spiritual 'over-trading'. It is unwise and unnecessary. In this sphere the Latihan will take care of virtually everything.

In relation to this very point, Pak Subuh has said, referring to our present spiritual poverty:'...it is also necessary to remember your own being and its needs. For you can be likened to a man who wishes to become rich, but who has no capital, no property, no equipment with which to start a business, so that his wish to become rich remains in his imagination. Therefore, you should remember and take thought for yourselves in this way. ..so that you can work according to the strength that is in you. As it is with you now, you have not got the strength that is required. Those of you who have already received the contact may wish to see many others receive it also. Some of you may wish to see a million members in England in the next six months. But what about this million if they cannot be looked after? ... Proceed slowly, therefore, little by little; a hundred, a thousand, two thousand, so long as they can all reach maturity and become complete.

7. It is clear that the ideal way for Subud to spread is by example. In the early stages this means a rather slow tempo, because none of us can yet even faintly claim to be a good example. Nevertheless, there will almost certainly be a snowball-growth effect as soon as more people begin to show evidence, in their daily dealings, that Subud is working in them.

In other words, Subud must emerge in the active life and we must consider ourselves more than a little responsible, within our limited capacities, to ensure that it manifests itself worthily.

Clearly this was a staging post for world domination (-: since 5 out of 6 of the original owners moved to other countries. None of the flats are now owned by Subud folk. We get constant lessons that everything is owned by the One Creator, do we not? Life is movement and in reality we do not 'own' anything, simply having the use of it for a period.

Our second lesson was to lose both our inherited shares of our family houses in the collapse of Premier Hotels. We had been warned not to put so much into it, but in our enthusiasm for an enterprise which seemed to be going well, with the promise of a high return and being very uncertain about whether we would stay in Greece, we foolishly committed everything we had.

After some years we felt that part of what we had to learn was to do our own project and not invest in someone else's. Harina had inherited a piece of land in a beautiful protected area only 700 metres from a long and unspoiled sandy beach, one hour out of Athens and less from Athens airport. A large tract had been bought by the Association of Court Employees (her father was a lawyer) split into plots for sale to the members and with small public squares, children's playgrounds and sport areas (e.g basketball courts). We decided to build the maximum we were allowed, with a view to selling half to keep the other half debt-free. The result was four 3-storey houses of 132 sq. m. (1,420 sq. ft.).

With all the blockages from the bureaucracy and from within ourselves, we can say that we took too long. The Greek debt crisis hit and produced our own debt crisis, since we had taken a large loan to build. One of the houses was sold, two-thirds finished, but for a lower price than we had expected. Since then Harina's salary, along with all public employees, was cut by 40%, while petrol doubled in price overnight, our allowance for four children was cut, etc. The housing market is totally dead, with 80% of building workers unemployed.

Here's the positive thing. This is a great opportunity for those with some free money. This now is rock bottom (although many Greeks will not drop their price if selling is not urgent). We, for example, are trying to sell one house, two-thirds finished, at bare building cost, in order to finish the other two. It's hardly possible for prices to go down further, as they would then not realize enough to repay the loans – the banks prefer to reduce the loan repayment than to take the property as they badly need cash.

So I leave you with another thought. If you would be interested in a shared ownership let me know (see advertisement). It can be done in the same way as the houses in Southern Spain, by creating a UK company to 'buy' the house with the owners as the shareholders.

Ex-pat Son of England Starts UK-based Enterprise

Robiyan Easty, living in Greece for the last 30 years and currently the Zonal Representative for Zone 4 on the WSC, had to find a source of income that was not based on the disastrous Greek economy. Robiyan had been giving private lessons in English and also Business English seminars for many years, but even this dried up to a trickle.

For some years he has been saying that it is a pity that we tend to create enterprises that are grand or complicated and ignore simple trading, which for many so-called spiritual organisations is a very big source of income. So Robiyan started looking into online marketing and after a year of pursuing one promising looking opportunity after another he decided that selling physical products on Amazon, eBay, etc, was the way to go.

Just at that moment he was asked to correct/translate a protest letter to the EU by the president of a company where he had taught business English. Their main business was selling diagnostic machines to hospitals but as a side-line had developed a complete range of face creams and cosmetics.

When Robiyan declined to take payment for the letter, the president's PA said, 'In that case we will send some creams and cosmetics for your wife and daughter.'

Harina and daughter Nurmala were both really impressed with the quality.

Robiyan then thought, 'Why don't I ask if they are being marketed internationally and if not, start with these.

.

There has been generally favourable feedback from the Subud sisters who received samples to test, one even saying that one of the creams was 'astounding', which is very encouraging

So Robiyan made a UK company called Dovetail Online Ltd, with the really nice logo Marcus Bolt created when they were in business together in the 70s and 80s. Now, after meeting several frustrating hurdles from the robotic bureaucracy, the first batch is in the UK with Marcus, who is helping out his old business partner in the initial phase, waiting for orders from eBay and Amazon.

Other products will gradually be added and especially high quality products sourced in Europe.

Robiyan has committed to giving 15% of the gross profit to Subud, probably to Subud Britain since Dovetail is a British company, with some earmarks for international projects. He has adopted the advice of a businessman brother to put this intention in writing, as he is doing here, to avoid the temptation to backtrack.
